Kim Kofron is the Director of Early Childhood for Children at Risk. Previously, she served as the Executive Director for the Texas Association for the Education of Young Children from 2014-2021. She hails from the great state of Illinois receiving her Bachelor of Science in Child Development from the University of Illinois but

found her way to Texas where she received her Master's in Education in Early Childhood Special Education from the University of Texas. Ms. Kofron has worked in many capacities in early childhood, working in both for-profit and non-profit child care settings as a 3-year-old teacher to Director to Manager of

and non-profit child care settings as a 3-year-old teacher to Director to Manager of Education for a multi-site statewide child care company in Texas. Kofron has served on Governor Perry's Commission on Licensing Standards and currently serves on Governor Abbott's Texas Early Learning Council.

Christine Thomas, MS is the Sr. Associate Director of the Center of Social Measurement and Evaluation for Children At Risk. (conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age) and their influence on wellness outcomes. Through the evaluation of data, she seeks to disrupt the current practices and policies which contribute to large disparities between communities in Texas. By incorporating her 8 years of clinical and behavioral experience and data informed methods, she works to engage social services organizations, foundations, researchers and any other collaborates who seek to improve outcomes of children most affected in Texas.

Jennifer Johnson is the founder of Project One Day (POD), a Houston 501c3 that generates 40 hours a week of free infant & toddler care for parents in need. POD trains parents to assist teachers. Parents volunteer one day and get four days free.



<u>Trey Oglesby</u> – Director of Family Enrichment Services, Children's Advocacy Center of Greater West Texas

I was born into a Christian home to parents who taught school and a father who was also a preacher. We moved around from time to time due to my father being an Army Chaplain, as well. After high school I enlisted in the U.S. Army and deployed to Bosnia and Iraq. Being a disabled veteran has helped in relating

to others who suffer from trauma and other mental health concerns. I've been married to my lovely bride for 15 years this December. We have two children. Taylor is 23 and Zayla is 3. I received my Bachelor of Science in Religion from Liberty University and went on to receive a Master of Divinity, Master of Theology and a Doctorate of Theology. I am currently working on a Doctorate of Christian Counseling with a concentration on the impact of unconditional love on trauma victims. Over the last decade my wife and I have worked with over 1000 at risk children in a Trauma Informed Care setting. I am currently the Director of Family Enrichment Services at the Children's Advocacy Center of Greater West Texas. I oversee the Parents As Teachers and the Family Connections programs.



<u>Troy Bush-DiDonato</u> – Community Engagement Officer, Episcopal Health Foundation

Troy Bush-DiDonato serves as the Senior Community Engagement Officer for the Episcopal Health Foundation, where he implements EHF's community engagement strategy through capacity-building training with community partners, grant partners, and congregations. Troy's career has traversed many sectors including public schools, clinical research, and

philanthropy. A native of Houston, Troy is a founding member and past Chair of the Houston-area Suicide Prevention Coalition and is currently serving on the Board for the Texas Suicide Prevention Collaborative.
