Viridiana Carrizales, Co-Founder & CEO, ImmSchools

Viridiana Carrizales is the co-founder and chief executive officer of ImmSchools. ImmSchools is an immigrant-led nonprofit organization that seeks to close the gap between immigration and education by working with schools to create safe and welcoming classrooms for immigrant and undocumented students. Prior to launching ImmSchools, Viridiana worked as the national managing director for Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) at Teach For America where she led the organizations efforts to recruit and place teachers with DACA in classrooms throughout the country. She began her journey as an immigrant activist in 2004 by co-founding a grassroots organization dedicated to organizing and informing undocumented students of their rights and access to higher education. Viridiana was born in Michoacán, Mexico and immigrated with her family to the United States when she was 11 years old. As a former undocumented immigrant, Viridiana is passionate about advocating and supporting undocumented students and their families. She has been recognized by the League of United Latin American Citizens and the Austin Chamber of Commerce for her leadership and dedication to the immigrant community. Viridiana holds a bachelor's degree in Spanish literature and communications from the University of Texas at Austin. After 14 years, she became a United States citizen in 2016 and currently resides in San Antonio, Texas.



Yvette Leno, Founder & Director, Beauty's Community Garden

Yvette Leno is a native Houstonian and the founder and director of Beauty's Community Garden. Twelve years ago, in 2012, Yvette founded the garden on land where her family homestead formerly stood. The garden is named after her grandmother "Beauty" and has become a place where Yvette dreamed of providing access to fresh produce in Independence Heights and surrounding food desert/food apartheid communities.



Jerry L. Hawkins, Executive Director, Dallas Truth, Racial Healing & Transformation (TRHT)

Jerry Hawkins is the Executive Director of Dallas Truth, Racial Healing & Transformation (DTRHT), part of a national 14-place initiative by The W.K. Kelloga Foundation. Dallas TRHT's mission is to create a radically inclusive city by addressing race and racism through narrative change, relationship building, and equitable policies and practices. Jerry is also a co-founder of The Imagining Freedom Institute (The IF Institute), a national research-based leadership group that helps organizations and institutions understand the historical context to contemporary issues of place, race, and space. Jerry was formerly the Project Director of Bachman Lake Together for The Dallas Foundation and Zero to Five Funders Collaborative, an early childhood collective impact initiative in Dallas, and Director of Children's Services at the Wilkinson Center in East Dallas/Southeast Dallas. Jerry is currently an Adjunct Professor at Texas Christian University, a 2024-2025 Institute For Nonprofit Practice's Black Leadership Institute Fellow, a 2022-2023 Independent Sector Bridging Fellow, a 2020-21 Presidential Leadership Scholar, a 2019 Leadership Arts Institute Fellow with the Business Council for the Arts, a Dallas County Historical Commission Member, a City of Dallas' City Plan Commission (CPC) Comprehensive Land Use Committee Appointee, served on Dallas ISD's Trustee-appointed Racial Equity Advisory Council and The Education Trust/ERS Resource Equity Working Group, and the United Way of Metropolitan Dallas/PolicyLink/National Fund for Workforce Solutions 'Pathways to Work' Workforce Equity Advisory Council. Jerry also serves on the boards of Leadership ISD, Deep Vellum Books, AccessH2O and Young Leaders, Strong City, Jerry has been awarded PBS/KERA's American Graduate Champion in 2017, was a 2022 nominee for "Best Community Leader" by The Dallas Weekly and was selected as one of the "Dallas 500 Most Powerful Business Leaders in North Texas" in 2021 and 2022 by D CEO/D Magazine. Jerry's first editorial offering, A People's History of Dallas, will be published in late 2024 by Deep Vellum Books. Jerry received his undergraduate degree in Early Childhood Education and Child & Family Services from Southern Illinois University in

Carbondale, and his master's degree in education from Northeastern Illinois University's Jacob H. Carruthers Center for Inner City Studies. While living in Chicago, Jerry worked for Chicago Urban



League and Chicago Public Schools.

Elvira has a passion for developing people and designing systems that foster equitable education pathways for all children. Elvira earned her B.S. in Biology and M.S.Ed. in Curriculum and Instruction from the University of Houston. Moreover, she holds a Certificate in School Management and Leadership from the Harvard Graduate School of Education and Harvard Business School. Currently she is a doctoral student at Baylor University where her focus is on learning design and organizational change.



Bethany Edwards- Ph.D., Southern Methodist University

Dr. Bethany Edwards graduated from Southern Methodist University with a doctoral degree in education policy and leadership. Her research focuses on the disparate experiences of students in the Texas special education system, with a focus on the relation between student race/ethnicity and special education referral and designation. She currently serves as the Director of the Early Learning Alliance (ELA), a cross-sector coalition in Tarrant County that leverages data and community connections to advocate for more equitable early education systems. She previously worked at the Center for the Study of Child Care Employment (CSCCE) at the University of California, Berkeley conducting policy research on the preparation and support of the early care and education workforce.

Previously he taught 2nd, 4th, and 5th grade bilingual language arts. He completed his undergraduate work at the College of Biblical Studies-Houston, obtaining a Bachelor of Science in Organizational Leadership. He holds two masters, a Master of Arts in Teaching from Relay Graduate School of Education and a Master of Education in Administration and Supervision from the University of Houston. Peter was named Teacher of the Year for his campus in 2017 and in 2018 was selected as an Emerging Leader by the Houston Hispanic Chamber of Commerce. He is currently finalizing his doctoral coursework at the University of St. Thomas-Houston and is expected to graduate May 2024 with a doctoral degree in Ethical Leadership. His first-hand experience as a child of immigrants and, currently, a bilingual public-school teacher that serves the Hispanic-American community, led him to conduct a study that focused on the role elementary public schools have when providing equitable access to Hispanic-American immigrant parents for parental engagement.
